#### A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke

From East and West they will come to take their place in the kingdom of God.

Through towns and villages Jesus went teaching, making his way to Jerusalem. Someone said to him, 'Sir, will there be only a few saved?' He said to them, 'Try your best to enter by the narrow door, because, I tell you, many will try to enter and will not succeed.

'Once the master of the house has got up and locked the door, you may find yourself knocking on the door, saying, "Lord, open to us" but he will answer, "I do not know where you come from." Then you will find yourself saying, "We once ate and drank in your company; you taught in our streets" but he will reply, "I do not know where you come from. Away from me, all you wicked men!"

'Then there will be weeping and grinding of teeth, when you see Abraham and Isaac and Jacob and all the prophets in the kingdom of God, and yourselves turned outside. And men from east and west, from north and south, will come to take their places at the feast in the kingdom of God.

'Yes, there are those now last who will be first, and those now first who will be last.'

#### Reflection

The vision of a disciple must be the vision of God. Disciples must see with wide angled lenses that enable them to recognise that God offers the grace of salvation to all. The passages from both Isaiah and Luke are astounding in their inclusivity. They show that God's saving grace is unbounded. It reaches out to those whom the people of God may not only distrust but sometimes even despise. There is something very dangerous about being smugly convinced of one's own salvation. When we are so sure of ourselves, we can easily fall into the error of being as sure of the moral failure of others as well. The gospel warns us against such judgment.

Women and men are gathered into the community of the saved, primarily because others have been sent out to get them. The psalm refrain is the command to go out to the whole world. The first reading describes God sending fugitives back home to get their relatives. People come from all over because someone is sent to get them. Today that command is directed to us. We are the ones who are being sent out to bring others to God. Unfortunately there are many people who do not believe that they are fit to be evangelisers. They may think that the work that they do or the lives that they live do not lend themselves to the task of spreading the good news of the gospel. 

#### JUBILEE YEAR 2025 - The Good Ship Hope

The Church's Jubilee tradition dates back to the year 1300, when Pope Boniface VIII declared the first

Holy Year. Originally held once every 100 years, Jubilees are now celebrated every 25 years as special times of renewal, pilgrimage, and grace.

As part of this Jubilee year, a symbolic pilgrimage is taking place through The Good Ship 'Hope' – a beautifully crafted boat inspired by the official Jubilee logo. Designed and built by our talented Newman College furniture teacher, Peter Hayes, the vessel will journey across the Lismore Diocese, beginning at Camden Haven Catholic Parish and concluding at St Joseph's Parish in Tweed Heads, before returning home to Newman College.

#### Unforgiveness eats us up

Forgiveness is not something natural to any of us; more natural is the desire to avenge the wrong done to us. There is an amusing twist in the Gospel about forgiveness. The Lord starts to preach about forgiveness, yet He ends up saying that those who will not forgive will be tortured. "Send him out to gnash his teeth." Torture, as you know, is the highest form of unforgiveness.

On the other hand, perhaps there is no twist to the Gospel because, you see, when we do not forgive, we become tortured. But the torture is not inflicted on us by God.

When we do not forgive, the torture is not inflicted on us by the priest who hears our sins. When you do not forgive, the torture comes to and from you. You inflict the penalty on yourself. You punish yourself. You rob yourself of peace and joy.

Christians who refuse to forgive, who harbour resentment in their hearts, who harbour bitterness inside themselves, torture, punish and rob themselves of so many graces. When you do not forgive, you become irritable. When you do not forgive, you become very grouchy. When you do not forgive, you become psychologically down. When you do not forgive, you are unable to sleep well.

When last did you forgive a brother or sister? Jesus knows we will experience hurts, betrayal, deceit and the host of other offences- but love covers this multitude of sins.

For your inner peace, learn to let go... Start serving God this very day. This may be the last day of your life. Live as if this day were your last. Tomorrow is uncertain, yesterday no longer belongs to you, only the present is yours.

Let us learn from Jesus, forgiveness is not an optional extra in Christian life. No, it is at the heart of the Gospel. A Christian must encourage and restore relationships and be willing to make peace always. We are called to be ministers of reconciliation and forgiveness in our daily life situations. Don't rob yourself of peace again.

All of us have people we may not like to forgive. All of us have in our

hearts people who irritate us because of what they did to us. Let us pray for such people today. Let us also pray for ourselves, that our hearts may be as forgiving as the heart of Jesus. Amen.
